President's Message:

Dear Members,

At the 1992 BPW/USA National Conference in Minneapolis there was a unique display as you walked to the convention hall – red plywood figures lining both sides



of the hallway. They were there because in 1990, a group of women artists and writers in Minnesota became alarmed by the growing number of women being murdered by their intimate partners or acquaintances. These women partnered with local community-based agencies and formed the Arts Action against Domestic Violence. Together, they began to speak out against domestic violence and honored those who died as a result of this

epidemic. The women created 26 free-standing, life-sized red wooden figures, each one bearing the name of a woman whose life ended violently at the hands of a husband, ex-husband, current or ex-partner, or acquaintance. A 27th figure was added to represent those uncounted women whose murders went unsolved or were erroneously ruled accidental. The figures were called the Silent Witnesses. (Domestic Violence Services of Cumberland and Perry Counties)

According to statistics from the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence:

- On average, nearly 20 people per minute are physically abused by an intimate partner in the United States.
- 1 in 4 women experience severe intimate partner physical violence, intimate partner contact sexual violence, and/or intimate partner stalking with impacts such as injury, fearfulness, post-traumatic stress disorder, use of victim services, contraction of sexually transmitted diseases, etc.
- 1 in 3 women have experienced some form of physical violence by an intimate partner. This includes a range of behaviors (e.g. slapping, shoving, pushing) and in some cases might not be considered "domestic violence."
- 1 in 4 women have been victims of severe physical violence (e.g. beating, burning, strangling) by an intimate partner in their lifetime.
- 1 in 7 women have been stalked by an intimate partner during their lifetime to the point in which they felt very fearful or believed that they or someone close to them would be harmed or killed.

- On a typical day, there are more than 20,000 phone calls placed to domestic violence hotlines nationwide.
- The presence of a gun in a domestic violence situation increases the risk of homicide by 500%.
- Intimate partner violence accounts for 15% of all violent crime.²
- Women between the ages of 18-24 are most commonly abused by an intimate partner.
- 19% of domestic violence involves a weapon.
- Domestic victimization is correlated with a higher rate of depression and suicidal behavior.
- Only 34% of people who are injured by intimate partners receive medical care for their injuries.
- 72% of all murder-suicides involve an intimate partner; 94% of the victims of these murder suicides are female.

Currently HR 1620, the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2021 sits in the Senate. It was passed by the House of Representatives on March 17, 2021 and would modify and reauthorize programs that seek to prevent and respond to domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking. The bill also authorized new programs, makes changes to federal firearms laws, and establishes new protections to promote housing stability and economic security for victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking.

We all now know the story of Gabby Petito but what about all the women we don't know about? We need to contact Senators Casey and Toomey and get them to support HR 1620 so we can hopefully prevent more women from becoming victims. Imagine how many more Silent Witnesses there have been since 1990.

Do you know what to do? Call 911 if you see that someone is being abused and is in immediate danger. If you suspect someone is being abused, learn what to ask and how to approach the situation. To quote President Tiffanie's theme, Be the change!

Bev is the founder and director of Integrate For Good and has been a member of CMC for 3 years.

Integrate for Good is an innovative nonprofit organization committed to empowering students and adults of all abilities to discover and share their talent through inclusive volunteerism, community leadership and meaningful employment.

The Integrate for Good model is designed to address the social barriers faced by children and

adults with disabilities using targeted strategies for increasing opportunity through three specific channels: Empowerment, Connection and Education. Our signature programs include Empowerment Lab, Opening Doors on Campus and Leadership Incubator.

For her work with children and adults with disabilities, Bev has received many awards:

- Temple University <u>Helen Hopkins Scholarship Award</u>
- Pediatric Therapeutic Services Therapist <u>5000 Challenge Award</u> for Staying Power, a curriculum Bev designed to support children with disabilities and their teachers (inaugural award)

- Montgomery County Office of Developmental Disabilities <u>Innovation and Technology Award</u> (inaugural award)

October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month

Every October, the nation observes National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Breast cancer is a disease that affects both men and women and is among the most common cancers. According to the National Breast Cancer Foundation, 1 in 8 women will develop invasive breast cancer in her lifetime. Next year, new breast cancer diagnoses are expected to number more than 200,000 for women and more than 2,000 for men. This month, Benefits.gov is raising awareness of preventative measures and helpful resources that may help you and your loved ones beat the odds.

What can I do to improve my chances of staying breast cancer free? There are many steps you and your loved ones can take to improve your chances

- Conduct monthly self-exams. In addition to medical screenings, the National Breast Cancer Foundation and many medical professionals recommend a monthly self-exam. To learn how to do a breast self-exam, check out this self-exam guide offered by NationalBreastCancer.org.
- Quit smoking. According to the National Cancer Institute (NCI), smoking is a significant risk factor for breast and many other types of cancer. Non-smokers are at lower risk than smokers regardless of your age or how long you have been a smoker.

• Exercise more. Regular exercise and a healthy diet can also lower your risk factors. (from Benefits.gov)
