Since the beginning of September, there have been tributes and memorials for the 20th anniversary of the attacks of September 11, 2001 and people on social media have shared their stories about their memories of that day. I could sit here and tell you about my memory of September 11th but I prefer to tell you about my memories of the days that followed. Unlike today, when the country seems so divisive, we all came together to celebrate each other and our differences.

One of the best examples of that occurred on September 20th when my niece Katie and I attended the first Flyers pre-season game since 9/11. After convincing my Mom we would be safe, we went down to the (then) First Union Center and as we entered the building were given small American flags. The game against the New York Rangers proceeded normally (well, as normally as it can be when two rivals play each other) for the first 2 periods and at the end of the second period, the game was tied 2-2.

Before the start of the third period, the attendance was announced at over 14,000 and instead of the usual between the period activities, one of the news channels was put on the jumbo screen right before President Bush's address to the nation. The players came out of their dressing rooms and were skating around but when the news feed was cut off to start the third period, the crowd booed and demanding the president's speech be aired instead.

Once President Bush began his speech, the arena became very quiet. Not the normal crowd response at a hockey game. It was the first time President Bush had addressed the nation since the terrorist attacks and everyone – spectators and players – wanted to hear what he had to say. The president mentioned that the number of those killed, injured or missing was estimated at over 14,000 and it hit me how instead of a vague number, all I had to do was look around the arena to imagine the faces of the victims. We cheered and waved our flags when the president talked about the bravery and courage of Todd Beamer and the other passengers of Flight 93, the firefighters and police officers who ran into the twin towers when everyone else was trying to get out, and the stories of selflessness of people helping each other in a time of crisis. If it had been any other team but the New York Rangers, I don't think the speech would have made such an impact. It

involved two of the three states where the terrorist attacks took place.

When the speech was over, the players no longer wished to continue the third period so they shook hands like they would after a playoff series, left the ice and ended the game – still a 2-2 tie. When asked why the players stopped the game, then Flyers defenseman Chris Therien said, "It would've been the most meaningless 20 minutes in the history of sports." Colin Newby from Broad Street Buzz wrote, "Fans from Philadelphia didn't need to cheer for the Flyers at that moment, and fans from New York didn't need to cheer for the Rangers either. They were unified as Americans in a way that might never be replicated in the future of professional sports."

I'm sharing this experience with you to show that if two of the most bitter rivals in NHL history, the Philadelphia Flyers and New York Rangers, could forget their differences for one night, we should all be able to look past our differences and disagreements in the face of the current pandemic crisis and heal this divided nation.

Honoring Her Dad



"As a child, Josephine Smith often told her dad she would be fighting fires right beside him when she grew up. It was her lifelong passion. But, that day never happened. Her father, Kevin Smith, a 23year veteran of the FDNY and a charter member of its Hazardous Materials Company 1 (HAZMAT), was one of the 343 FDNY members who perished after responding to the September 11, 2001

attacks on the World Trade Center.

FDNY HAZMAT shares their quarters with Squad 288 in Maspeth, Queens, and the two units work closely with one another. They lost a combined 19 men (11 from HAZMAT) on 9/11, which was the greatest number of firefighters lost from a single firehouse that day. At the time of the attacks, HAZMAT had 39 members (four officers and 35 firefighters). A total of 51 children were left fatherless when the firefighters of HAZMAT and Squad 288 lost their lives while saving others. Kevin, who earlier in life served as a corporal in the United States Marine Corps, was the father of eight.

Josephine was 21 years old when she lost her dad. But, her desire to follow in his footsteps never abated. In fact, after 9/11, Josephine became even more driven to fulfill her dream of being a member of the FDNY. Fast forward 13 years and the promise she made to her dad was fulfilled. In November of 2014, after 18 weeks of intense, vigorous training, Josephine graduated from the Fire Academy and became the first daughter of a fallen 9/11 responder to join the ranks of the FDNY. Today, Josephine is the lone female firefighter in the FDNY's Engine 39 Ladder 16 located on the upper east side of Manhattan. She epitomizes what the Stephen Siller Tunnel to Towers Foundation's StandTall mantra represents. Josephine is devoted to a life of putting service before self. Not only does she honor her father each day she puts on the uniform, she's serves as a tremendous role model, encouraging and inspiring women interested in becoming firefighters to follow their dreams."

That box was delivered to Nancy by Joanne Hogue of the Cresson BPW, in District 5. Nancy passed the crafts and a whole bunch of journals (including some very nice self-published journals with original photo covers from Nancy's hairdresser!) to me at the District 11 Fall Meeting at Maggiano's.
